EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The College named after **Bharat Ratna Shri. K. Kamaraj** as a tribute to the invaluable service rendered by him to our nation, particularly to the cause of education to the downtrodden in Tamilnadu was founded in 1966 by the Tuticorin Education Society with Mr. A.M.M.S. Ganesan as founder Patron of the college. At present, Mr. A.M.M.S.G. Kathiresan B.E., as the Patron and Mr V.Ilango, as the president lead the Institution successfully following the footsteps of his forerunners.

The college was affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai till 1990 and now affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli. The College is non-communal, non-sectarian and has paramount objectives to give higher educational facilities to the students of southern districts of Tamilnadu.

As the institution enters into the Golden Jubilee year 2015-2016, this introspection bears testimony to our renewed commitment to excellence and quality in education. At this historic juncture, we are very much pleased to enter into the second phase of accreditation by NAAC. We strongly believe that introspection of our growth after the first cycle assessment in 2004 will reaffirm our commitment to quality of education for the local community. The experience underwent from the first cycle assessment, the interaction with the peer team and its report gave us an impetus to diversify our activities. NAAC has been a guiding force for the present and future programmes, functions and activities. As per the suggestions of the peer team, the College has taken steps to enhance the quality of higher education.

The College has been recognized by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(b). It offers eighteen under-graduate courses, ten post-graduate courses, three M.Phil., and two Ph.D. programmes. Besides, two diploma courses and one PG diploma course are also offered. It has two research centres in mathematics and Zoology.

In the past five years under-graduate programmes in B.Com., B.Com., (Computer Applications), B.Com. (Corporate Secretaryship), B.A. in English and post-graduate programmes in M.Com., (Computer Applications), M.Sc. Chemistry, M.A. English,

M.A. History and M.Phil., courses in Commerce with Computer Application, Mathematics and Zoology were started under self supported programmes. The Department of Mathematics was upgraded as a Research Centre.

The College follows the curriculum of Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli. To address the concerns on environmental awareness among the students which is one of the urgent agenda of our country's development, course on "Environmental Studies" was introduced as a compulsory subject for all the U.G. students. Normally the curriculum is revised once in three years taking into consideration of the emerging new trends in the academic upliftment and the need of the local community.

'Choice Based Credit System'- CBCS has been introduced in the College as per the direction of the Manonmaniam Sundarnar University, Tirunelveli. Regarding the admission of students, the Government norms are followed maintaining complete transparency. The recruitment of teachers is made on merit basis. Student services are taken care of systematically. Grievances related to examinations, issue of certificates and testimonials, employment verifications are attended to with utmost seriousness.

A Language Laboratory caters to the needs of the students for developing their communication skills. The College has constructed toilets for differently-abled students and a restroom for women. There is a UGC Network Resource Center which supports internet facility to the faculty members and research scholars. One major research project supported by DST and two minor research projects from UGC are in progress now.

The College has seven NSS units, two NCC units (Army and Naval Wings). Various Committees have been constituted for curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities like Quiz club, Yoga Club, Environment club, Photographic club, Electronic club, Humour club, Creative Writing and Elocution club, Music, Dance and Theatre Arts club, Drawing, Painting, Rangoli and Kolam Club, Journalism Club, Salesman Club, Consumer Club, Red Ribbon Club and a Placement Cell. The College is interested in promoting sports and games and the management liberally gives funds for sports activities.

The “Blood Donors’ Club” is doing yeoman service by encouraging students for blood donation to the needed community on emergency response and create awareness among them on blood donation.

The College gets University ranks every year. A student advisory system is functioning in the College. The advisor is in charge of a class and he maintains close contact with the students and their parents. He looks after the welfare of his wards in academic and personal matters throughout the course. The service is extended even after the completion of the course.

The College Committee issues policy direction to the College. The IQAC plays a vital role in quality assurance. The advisors with the help of the Students’ Redressal Cell settle the grievances of the students, if any. The Women’s Welfare Committee takes care of the women related activities. A conducive atmosphere for learning prevails in the College.

The College has opted for subjecting itself for re-accreditation. A Committee is formed with the leadership of the Coordinator of IQAC to prepare the NAAC Re - accreditation Report. The SSR is prepared on the basis of the AQARs and other documented information. The SSR is submitted to NAAC and the College awaits the visit of the peer team.

- Close teacher-student relationship as well as faculty-administration

- Well-equipped Laboratory for all science departments.
- Creation of awareness towards employment in both public and private sectors to the students by conducting coaching classes for competitive examinations.
- Increase in the number of girl students in the College every year, inspite of the availability of three Women Colleges in the City.

WEAKNESSES

- Communication skills of the students are not very encouraging and many students have poor command over English language
- As most of the students are first generation rural learners, it becomes very difficult to train them to develop their soft skills.
- Very difficult to avoid absentees in the classes.
- Dependence of University for academic activities
- Improper ratio of students and staff.

- No separate boys' rest room.
- No audio visual room.
- Insufficient transport facilities. We provide only one bus for transport.
- Student strength increased to 2000 but the seating capacity available in the auditorium is not sufficient.
- Salary burden on management for temporary staff.
- No UG & PG programme in management and administration.
- Delay in providing permanent vacancies in office of the Principal by the Government leads to delay in day-to-day affairs.
- Water problem persists.
- No students union.
- Lack of proper motivation among many students
- Lacks of encouragement towards getting research grants from funding agencies in spite of many faculties with Ph.D.
- Deficiency in faculty/student publications.
- Lack of dissemination lectures of research findings by the staff and the students
- Less interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary
- Inadequacy of fund to conduct various programmes and activities
- Limited job opportunities for students

OPPORTUNITIES

- Our College is having an area of 50 Acres. At present we are using only 30 to 40% of the total area. The remaining vacant space is enough to add further educational infrastructure. Hence there is a great scope for starting new courses.
- UGC, DST and NAAC, which motivate the teachers to apply for grants to conduct seminars and also to apply for major and minor projects.
- UGC grants for conducting NET coaching classes and competitive examinations, helps the teachers to focus on training the students.
- Adequate recognition and rewards to the students for their activities in curricular and co-curricular activities.

- Enrichment of subject knowledge by organizing more seminars / workshops.
- Most of our alumni are doing business in and around Thoothukudi. An activity of alumni has strengthened the infrastructure of the College, which leads to developmental activities.

CHALLENGES

- Inability to start Aided Courses both at the UG and PG levels.
- Inability to get motivated students because of the plethora of Engineering Colleges.
- Lack of interest in pursuing higher education and career advancement due to rural background.
- Increasing competition from nearby Colleges.
- Achieving academic brilliance.
- Inspiring the Faculty members to gear up its changing and progressive paradigm in Higher Education.
- Majority of students hail from low socio-economic background and some are first generation learners.
- Seek autonomy in curriculum designing and student evaluation processes.
- Build competencies in the students for more effective community engagement
- Enhance employability
- Facilitate the interaction with the community on a weekly basis and integrate the classroom lessons to the community.
- Diversify the levels of involvement and methods of interventions to make the extension activities creative and exciting for all the stakeholders.
- Integrate research to the extension involvements whereby studying the community becomes integral to the activities undertaken there.
- Strengthen the existing community involvement by broadening its scope and heightening its intensity
- Build skills for creative outlook on current and live issues in society.

1.1.1 The vision, mission and objectives of the institution – the way in which these are communicated to the students, staff members (teaching and non – teaching) and other stakeholders.

Vision

Established with a view to spread the significance of higher education, our institution works hard for academic excellence, ensuring, strong morality and a gentle vision as the foundation of culture aimed at emerging as a leading institution offering need-based and livelihood oriented Education.

Mission

The College, which is a non-communal, non-sectarian, has its principal object to train the students to be high-quality citizens and to give higher educational facilities to the downtrodden students of southern districts of Tamilnadu. Our College motivates the students to develop their self confidence and shape their own future according to their ambitions. Our institution provides value-based education and quality-centered research programmes at affordable cost.

Objective

The objective of the college is to convey knowledge, skill and values to the rural youth.

- i) On the very first working day, the class advisors explain the vision and the mission of the college to the first year students, and the Principal also speaks to the parents and the students underlining the vision and the mission of the college in addition to the rules and regulations of the college.
- ii) The vision and mission of the college are also given in the college website.
- iii) The objective of our college is incorporated in the college emblem itself.

1.1.2 Action plans developed and deployed for effective implementation of the curriculum. - Details of the process.

The Principal conducts the meeting of HOD's at the beginning of every semester and whenever it is necessary the action plans are discussed for the effective implementation of the curriculum of the concerned semester. The Department-wise meetings are also conducted by the Principal to frame the plan of action for the semester. Optional papers, Non-Major Elective papers for the semester will be finalized. Subject allotment for the teachers will be finalized. Teachers will chart out their own plans in such a way that the syllabus is covered in three phases. At the end of each phase an internal assessment test will be conducted and assignments are also given to assess the in-depth knowledge of the students. In case of PG classes, the students are encouraged to take seminar in their classes on a particular topic, which develops the self confidence of the students.

At the beginning of every year, the officers in-charge of NCC, NSS and Sports visit each and every first year UG class and explain the merits of the related programmes and stimulate the students to join any one of the above programmes. The students are given freedom to select the programme on their own accord without any compulsion.

Some of our teachers are members of the Board of Studies of our University. The faculties are attending meetings conducted by the university regarding the changes in the curriculum.

1.1.3 Type of support (procedural and practical) the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices.

The management feels that no class should suffer for want of teachers, so apart from the permanent Staff members they appoint teachers temporarily in the place of retired teachers to handle these classes. In addition to this, the management provides funds for the purchase of new books and equipments,

and to conduct seminars / workshops. Our management also provides funds for purchasing three interactive boards which is very helpful to improve the quality of teaching, at the same time minimize the work of the teacher. It also enhances the understanding capacity of the students.

1.1.4 Initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The management encourages the faculty to attend seminars and conferences to enrich their knowledge in their respective field. The management provides sufficient infrastructural facility and funds for the effective delivery of curriculum. The college faculties are given training to use the computers, internet, LCD projectors, interactive boards etc. in order to supplement their class room lectures. In addition to the regular subject classes, the Departments organize special lectures by inviting experts from various fields to share their knowledge with the students. The College also organizes special Personality Development Programmes for the students. The students are also taken out for educational tours and industrial visits to gain experience on their related subjects. For the effective delivery of curriculum the following measures are taken by the faculties:

- Time table is prepared by the Heads of the departments in consultation with other members well in advance and the same is informed to the students. A copy of the departmental time table and individual time tables are submitted to the office of the Principal.
- Department meetings are conducted to know the status of the completion of the syllabus.
- Three internal tests are conducted by the departments for each semester.
- Feed back is obtained from the students about the attitude of teachers in completion of the syllabus and in maintaining a cordial relationship with the students.

- Students are encouraged to use the photo copying facilities available in the Library and the Book depot by paying a minimum charge.
- MOUs are signed with the respective industries by the college for student training.

1.1.5 Institution network interaction with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum.

Senior faculties of our College are serving as the members of the Board of Studies of M.S.University. Through the Board of studies, our college teachers interact with the University regarding the curriculum. They also provide valuable inputs to the University through the members of the Curriculum Development Cell. Study tour is a part of the curriculum in some subjects. Through the study tours the students have linkage with the industries by way of field visit. In our college the Department of Tamil, Commerce, Economics, Physics, Chemistry and Computer Science are not Research Centres but many of our faculty of the above departments are guiding research scholars for Ph.D., and thereby developing good relationship with the faculties of other Research centres and Universities.

The Department of Physics conducted a two day National Seminar on “Climate Change Impacts on Environment” on 4th & 5th April, 2013.

Environmental Education

In our college we have Environmental Studies as one of the compulsory subjects to all UG classes. This enables the students to know more about the environmental issues.

ICT

In our college we have a language laboratory with all the facilities to enable the students to develop their communication skills. Internet facilities are available in all the departments and in General library for the students and the faculty. IT related subjects are incorporated in M. Sc Mathematics. Smart class room is available in our college in which all the technologies are used by the faculty for effective teaching. We have more than 100 computers, 20 printers, and 5 LCD projectors. The members of the staff can access the e-Journals from UGC N-List programme and use the Internet facility in the library during the working hours on all the working days.

1.3.4 The various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students.

Moral and ethical values

Social Value Education is taught to all the under graduate students in order to create social awareness. Instead of value based education, the subject “MANAVALAKKALAI YOGA” is taught to the first year students of B.Com., B.Sc Physics, Maths and Botany. Meditation classes are also handled for these students. Simplified Kundalini Yoga is also practiced by the students, which promotes the moral and ethical values in them.

Employable and life skills

Coaching classes for competitive examinations are conducted for the final UG and PG students by Dr P.Densingh, the then Head of the department of Zoology for imparting knowledge on test of reasoning and other skills.

Better career options

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of our college help the students to identify career options. Further advertisements regarding job opportunities are displayed in the library notice board.

Community orientation

NCC, NSS, and RRC help the students to have close contact with the society and render service to them. The blood donation is carried out by the Blood Donors club. Each and every year the number of Blood donors is considerably increasing. Whenever the NSS special camps are conducted in the nearby villages a blood donation camp will also be organized.

The Red Ribbon club renders life saving services to the people of the surrounding area by conducting AIDS awareness programmes. The Road Safety Patrol helps the people by regulating and managing the crowd during the local festivals and other occasions.

These programmes create social awareness, leadership quality, social responsibility and understanding among the students. Increased healthy bondage between the students and the society enhance the overall personality of the students.

Personality Development

In the curriculum itself “Personality Development” as a subject is included. Guest lectures are arranged on personality development.

Whenever a change in the syllabus is made by the M.S.University, the senior faculties of our College who are the members of Board of studies of the University give suitable suggestions for enhancing the quality of the syllabus. Our college has six faculties who are the members in various Boards of studies and one senate member. Students are the best judges for evaluating the teachers.

For the purpose of improving and developing the quality of teaching, a feedback is received from the III year UG and II year PG students through a printed questionnaire. Suitable analysis is made on the feedback given by the students and necessary developments are made in the teaching methods during the following semester. (Enclosed in Annexure – III)

1.3.6 Monitoring and evaluating the quality of enrichment programmes by the Institution.

Our college has a Convener for each and every committee with three other members. This committee meets at regular intervals and makes necessary arrangements for guest lectures in the related field. After the completion of the guest lectures, a feedback is collected from the student participants. Based upon the feedback given by the students necessary efforts will be taken for changing the resource person or for changing the theme of the guest lectures.

- Department Of Science & Technology, New Delhi has sanctioned Rs 9,75,000 to organize **INSPIRE – Science Camp** held during Nov – 2012, 2013 and 2014 at Kamaraj College, Thoothukudi. Nearly 190 Higher secondary students with high score (> 95%) in 10th standard participated in each camp.

Teaching Learning & Evaluation

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 Ensuring publicity and transparency in the admission process by the college.

The students are admitted in UG and PG as per the Tamil Nadu Government norms (90% merit and 10% management quota) for the aided programmes. For self- financed courses 50% of the seats are filled by the norms fixed by the Government and the remaining 50% of the seats are filled by the management as per the reservation policy of the Tamil Nadu Government.

2.1.2 The criteria adopted and process of admission.

- Admissions are made as per the guidelines of the Government of Tamil Nadu as stated below:
- 10% of the seats are reserved as management quota.
- The remaining 90% of the seats are filled on the basis of merit and the communal reservation policy as prescribed below
- Open Competition (OC) - 31%
- Backward Class (BC) - 30% (3.5% for Muslims)
- Most Backward Class (MBC) - 20%
- Scheduled Caste (SC) - 18%
- Scheduled Tribe (ST) - 1%

Certain seats are reserved for special categories as detailed below:

- ✓ Sports Quota U.G. - 3% of the total seats.
- ✓ P.G. - 2% of the total seats.
- ✓ Physically Handicapped UG - 3% of the total seats.
- ✓ Ex-servicemen quota UG - 6 seats.
- ✓ For candidates of the Union Territories of Andaman and Nicobar: U.G. - 2 seats.

Our college adopts open counselling system for admitting new entrants. After receiving the filled in application forms for all courses, a rank

list for each course is prepared after scrutiny. While receiving the application forms, candidates are provided with written information about the date and time of counselling for admission. Those candidates who have sent their applications by post are informed of the counselling details by post. Counselling is conducted for two days viz., the first day for the Commerce, Maths and History discipline and the second day for the other Arts and Science disciplines.

The Committee headed by the Principal, concerned Department Head, and other staff members will invite the candidates as per their rank and government reservation policy. Candidates, if selected for more than one courses, can opt for the course of their preference. The selected students will be issued admission card on the spot by the Principal.

2.1.4 Mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and students profiles annually. - Outcome of such an effort and contribution to the improvement of the process.

Our college admission committee reviews the admission process after the admission is over. In addition to that, Joint Directorate of Collegiate Education verifies the admission process of our college.

a) SC / ST

Free application is issued to the students belonging to SC/ST category.

Government norms on reservation policies are strictly followed. (18% for SC and 1% for ST) One senior member from the SC/ST community is included in the admission committee to ensure that no students are deprived of their privileges.

b) BC / MBC

Government policy is strictly followed

c) Women

Boys and Girls are admitted in UG and PG courses. There is no separate reservation for girl students. The details are given below:

d) Differently – abled

As per the reservation policy of the Government, eligible differently-abled candidates are admitted. Reservation quota is followed during counselling itself.

e) Economically weaker section

There are no criteria for admitting economically weaker students. Since the college is located in a rural area, most of the students are from economically weaker sections.

f) Minority community

As per the Government norms, 3.5% of the seats are allotted to minority community (Muslims) within the quota reserved for BC.

g) Sports Personnel

As per the reservation policy of the Government, students with meritorious sports background are given admission under sports quota. (3% for UG and 2% for PG). Our Management provides funds to the sportsmen to pursue their studies.

Overall, there is no significant change in the demand ratio. The ratio in some of the courses is less than one, since the Government of Tamil Nadu Admission Policy for admission is followed. As per the policy of the Government of Tamil Nadu applicants have to submit only one application stating the preference of the course. Hence, the applications for Economics are less than the selected candidates. The applicants who applied for B.Com/B.B.A courses join B.A Economics course since they didn't get seats in B.Com/B.B.A courses.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The way in which the institution caters to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard.

The class room in the first floor will be shifted to the ground floor to facilitate differently-abled students, even if there is only one such student. Other students are asked to help the differently-abled students inside the class room, college and in the hostel. The institution ensures the adherence to Government policies with regard to differently-abled students by assisting them to get Government scholarships.

2.2.2 Assessing the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme.

Admission of students for UG classes is made on the basis of marks secured in the Higher Secondary class. If the department feels that the students are very poor in the grasping power the faculties will come to the level of the students and explain the subjects in a very simple manner.

2.2.3 Strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice.

Bridge course

Kamaraj College is situated in the most backward area of the Southern districts of Tami Nadu. To cater to the needs of the education backward students from the schools, the Dept. of English has ventured into commencing the English course by offering a Bridge course in the 1st week of the academic year. This course is common to all the 1st year students of Kamaraj College.

Aims and objectives:

- The bridge course concentrates to make the students strong in reading and understanding listening and understanding English.
- It helps the students to express their ideas in English language meaningfully in a practical manner.
- It helps them achieve competence in the basic four skills-listening, reading, speaking and writing.

Every day the students are to attend 3 Hrs of English language classes. During this week only the English teachers from the Department of English handle the classes exclusively. The whole course consists of 15 units. (3 units per day for 5 days). During the course the students are given special training in the area of conversational practice intonation practice, stress in English language, comprehending a passage and bits of basic Grammar.

The bridge course facilitates an enjoyable language learning experience to students without the pressure of the examinations. It is an ice-breaking ceremony for both the students and teachers to work for 2 yrs with every batch in a cordial way.

A second Orientation programme focusing on the use of Library, sports facilities, NCC, NSS, is conducted within ten days of their

joining the college.

Remedial courses

Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners and under achievers in all the departments with the help of the UGC fund under Merged Scheme.

2.2.4 Sensitizing the staff and students by the Institution on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.

Gender

In our College there is a Women welfare committee headed by Prof M.Rajeswari, Head, Department of History, assisted by Dr P.Sivagami, Asso. Prof of Maths, Dr K.Bhanumathi Asst. Prof of Zoology and Dr J.Poongodi, Asso. Prof of Physics, which look into the problems faced by the girl students and take necessary steps to solve those problems. Tmt Rajam Devadass, a lawyer from outside is playing a vital role in giving necessary advice to this women welfare committee.

Environment

In our college, we have environmental studies as a subject to teach the students about environmental issues.

2.2.5 Identifying and responding to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners by the Institution.

Advanced learners are identified by the teacher in-charge of the various classes and they are advised and encouraged to score high marks in the university examinations for getting university ranks. The advanced learners in PG classes are encouraged to appear for NET/SLET and CSIR examinations.

2.2.6 The method in which the institute collects, analyzes and uses the data and information on the performance (through the programme

duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided).

For each U.G. class, a teacher in-charge is nominated by the department Heads. The teacher in-charge is responsible for the development of the students in that class. Usually a bio-data form is supplied to all the first year students and the filled bio-data form is collected back and filed properly by the teacher in-charge. The advisor plays the role of a parent, teacher and counsellor. He has personal and constant touch with the students and offers guidance and counselling to them, both in their academic and personal matters.

2.3. Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 Planning and organizing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

In our College at the beginning of every year the academic calendar is prepared taking into account the number of working days, holidays, the reopening day and the last working day. The number of working days per semester is ninety days as per the direction of the Government. The general time tables are prepared by the experienced senior most teachers. The specific time tables are prepared by the respective Heads of the department in consultation with other faculty members. Department meetings are conducted at regular intervals and teachers are asked to complete the syllabus in three phases.

2.3.2 Contribution of IQAC to improve the teaching – learning process.

2.3.3 Student-centric learning - the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative

learning and independent learning among the students.

Interactive learning

Interactive learning is effected through Question answer sessions, problem solving. Interaction with senior students is done by getting study materials and clarifying doubts with faculty formally and informally outside the classroom.

Collaborative learning

Collaborative learning is effected through Group discussion, Case study Debate, Association activities in all the departments, group project in the final semester for all the UG courses, field and industrial visit by NSS units, by NCC Army and Navy, Youth Red Cross, Yoga Club, Blood donation club, Humour club and Creative writing and Elocution Club.

Independent learning

Independent learning is effected through Assignments, seminars in every subject for all PG courses, individual projects for all the PG courses and by the practical work done in the laboratories for all science subjects and Mathematics and acquisition of language skills in the English Language Lab. Students are encouraged to participate and present papers in conferences and workshops organized by our College and by other institutions. Home exercises are given to the students especially for problem oriented subjects. Students are encouraged to make use of the internet facilities and to learn through open study resources.

2.3.4 Nurturing critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators.

Enthusiastic participation of the students in the college magazines,

campus news, hostel, manuscript, magazines and participation in literary and cultural competitions are encouraged to promote critical, creative and innovative thinking.

2.3.5 The technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching. - Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

In our college we have a language laboratory with all the facilities which enables the students to develop their communication skills. Internet facilities are available in all the departments and the General library for the students and the faculty. IT related subjects are incorporated in M. Sc Mathematics. Smart class room is available in our college in which all the technologies are used by the faculty for effective teaching. We have more than 178 computers, 12 printers, and 5 LCD projectors. The members of the staff can access the e-Journals from UGC N-List programme and use the Internet facility in the library during the working hours on all the working days.

2.3.6 Exposure of the students and faculty to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.).

All the faculty members are encouraged to participate in seminars, symposia, conferences, Orientation/Refresher courses, organise seminars/workshops and arrange guest lectures in order to cope up with recent developments. In all these seminars, workshops and guest lectures, students participate in large numbers.

We have Research departments in Mathematics, Zoology. In all the other UG Departments and Tamil department, part-time research scholars are being guided by our research guides. Fourteen faculty members of our college are guiding 42 Ph.D., scholars.

2.3.7 Process and the number of students benefitted on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students.

In our College we have been following Teacher in-charge system in which all the teachers in-charge are playing the role of advisers in solving the problems of students in the concerned classes. In addition to that we have Career Guidance cell, Placement Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell in our College.

2.3.8 Innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years - The efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning.

Innovative Teaching

Innovative teaching is ensured through power point presentations using LCD projectors, Group discussions, seminars, quiz and the like.

Efforts taken by the institutions

The following efforts have been taken by the institution to adopt new and innovative approaches:

- Availability of five LCD projectors
- Internet connection to all the departments and library.
- Well equipped language laboratory
- Smart class room

Impacts

The innovative practices have made the following impact on the students:

- Overall personality of the students has been enhanced.
- The skills which are essential for increasing the employability of the students have been developed.

2.3.9 Usage of library resources to augment the teaching- learning process.

- The Library is kept open on all working days from 9.00 A.M to 4.30 P.M.
- From 9.00 A.M to 4.30 P.M on examination days and during summer vacation.
- Staff can access the e-Journals from UGC N-List programme and use the Internet facility in the library during the working hours of all working days free of cost.
- Every year the Librarian gives orientation to all the First Year Degree students about the facilities and function of the Library.
- News paper clippings / cuttings on Higher Education, Appointments, etc., are put up in the Library Notice Board for students' reference.
- In addition, Newspaper Clippings File is maintained in the Library for ready reference.
- The Librarian displays the book Jackets that are recently purchased and include it in the Library collection to motivate the students to see the new arrivals, etc.

Library Automation and Internet Facility:

- ❖ At present, Library is fully automated with the help of new software called “LIBRARY MANAGER”.
- ❖ The services like the issue, collection and searching of books are done with the help of computers.
- ❖ One computer has been kept in Stack room for reference with *OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue)*.
- ❖ The periodicals and research journals available in the library help the students to present papers in seminars, conferences, etc. This also activates the research work of the faculty members and the students.

2.3.10 Challenges faced by Institution in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar.

The problem of not completing the curriculum within the stipulated time did not arise at all.

2.3.11. The method of monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching learning.

Quality of the teaching, learning process is monitored and evaluated through the performance of the students in the internal tests, seminars, assignments and university examinations.

The final year PG and UG students of our college are given a form in which they have to express their feedback about the effectiveness of the teaching in writing. The feedback form is prepared on the basis of the suggestions and recommendations of NAAC.

During the social break-up function organized by the final year PG and UG students almost all the students feel free to express their opinion about their classmates and the teachers too. It is an appreciable thing that they always talk without any hesitation about the merits and demerits of the facilities available in the College. They are not reluctant to convey their opinion regarding some facilities which are not available in the College. All

these things will lead to the improvement in the attitude of teachers and the development of new facilities in the College campus.

Recruitment of Teachers

The teachers are appointed for the aided courses on merit basis as per the norms fixed by the UGC and State Government. The roster system as prescribed by the State Government is strictly followed. A selection committee, as given below, is constituted as per the UGC norms.

- i) Chairperson of the Governing Body of the college or his/her nominee to be the Chairperson of the selection committee.
- ii) The Principal of the concerned college
- iii) One senior teacher/Head of the department (of the concerned subject) preferably having not less than 10 years of service as a teacher.
- iv) Two nominees of the Vice Chancellor of the affiliating university of whom one should be a subject expert.
- v) Two subject experts not connected with the college to be nominated by the chairperson of the Governing Body out of a panel of names approved by the Vice Chancellor.

Self- financed courses and ad-hoc appointment

The candidates are called for an interview through newspaper advertisement. On the basis of the performance in the interview appointment is made by the management committee.

Retention of Teachers

The following measures are taken by the management for the retention of the teachers:

- ❖ The management motivates the teachers to apply for minor and major projects from various funding agencies like UGC, DST and Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology.
- ❖ Management provides all the necessary infrastructural facilities for setting up research centre proposed by various teachers. Our management has provided a separate, well equipped room for the major projects of Dr. G.Vanmathi, department of Chemistry.
- ❖ Study leave is granted to faculty members, as soon as they are selected to pursue their research degrees.

- ❖ The management encourages the staff members to attend orientation/refresher courses. Seventeen faculty members have attended refresher courses and nine members have attended orientation courses.
- ❖ The management also offers support to teachers to organize national/International seminars/conferences /workshops to equip the teachers to meet the changing needs of the curriculum.

2.4.4 Policies/systems followed to recharge teachers. - providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.

- ❖ The management motivates the teachers to apply for minor and major projects from various funding agencies like UGC, DST and Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology.
- ❖ Management provides all the necessary infrastructural facilities for setting up research centre proposed by various teachers. Our management has provided a separate, well equipped room for the major projects of Dr. G.Vanmathi, department of Chemistry.
- ❖ Study leave is granted to faculty members, as soon as they are selected to pursue their research degrees.
- ❖ The management encourages the staff members to attend orientation/refresher courses. Sixteen faculty members have attended refresher courses and nine members have attended orientation courses.
- ❖ The management also offers support to teachers to organize national/International seminars/conferences /workshops to equip the teachers to meet the changing needs of the curriculum.

2.4.6 Evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers. – Use of evaluation for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process.

Quality of the teaching-learning process is monitored and evaluated through the performance of the students in the internal tests, seminars, assignments and university examinations. .

The final year PG and UG students of our college are given a form in which they have to express their feedback about the effectiveness of the teaching in writing. The feedback form is prepared on the basis of the suggestions and recommendations of NAAC.

During the social break-up function organized by the final year PG and UG students almost all the students feel free to express their opinion about

their classmates and the teachers too. It is an appreciable thing that they talk without any hesitation about the merits and demerits of the facilities available in the College. They are not reluctant to convey their opinion regarding some facilities which are not available in the College. All these things lead to the improvement in the attitude of teachers and the development of new facilities in the College campus.

2.5 Evaluation process and reforms

2.5.1 Ensuring that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes.

Since the first year UG students are coming from higher secondary schools, they are unaware of the mechanism of the semester system. Hence the teacher in-charge of the first UG class will explain the valuation methods available in the semester pattern such as internal test and assignments. For first PG students, in addition to the internal test and assignment, seminar will be taken by each and every student.

The schedule of internal tests will be informed to the students well in advance so as to enable them to prepare for the tests. The pattern of question paper is also informed to the students. In our college several teachers are involved in the valuation of the university examination papers.

2.5.2 The major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and the reforms initiated by the institution on its own.

Evaluation reforms initiated by the university

- University Examination timetables are displayed in the College notice board as soon as it is received from the university. University examinations are conducted as per the schedule given by the University.

- The university has made a special arrangement for conducting supplementary examinations for those students who have failed in only one paper in the last semester. This system enables them to go for higher studies immediately, without losing one academic year.
- Re-examinations are conducted separately for the sports/NCC/NSS/ students who are away on other duty during the university examination by Manonmaniam Sundaranar University.
- Retests are also conducted for the students who could not write the test because of their participation in cultural festivals.

Evaluation reforms initiated by our college

As our college is an affiliated college, reformation in evaluation process in the University examination is not possible. But in the university ‘internal tests’ we have made changes. The internal tests are conducted department-wise.

2.5.3 Ensuring the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own.

Implementation of the evaluation reforms by the university

- The university has made a special arrangement for conducting supplementary examinations for the students who have failed in only one paper in the last semester. This system enables them to go for higher studies immediately, without losing one academic year.
- Further, Sports / NCC / NSS students are informed about the special examination through the respective officers.
- Revaluation applications are immediately forwarded by the Principal to the university.
- Records regarding the university result of the students, their revaluation details and supplementary and special examination details are effectively maintained in our college.

Implementation of the evaluation reforms initiated by our college

The dates of the three Internal Assessment Tests are mentioned in the College handbook. In our College the internal tests are conducted for the different majors by the respective departments on these dates. In each and every department there will be a teacher in-charge of these internal tests. He/She will be collecting the question paper from all the members of concerned departments.

A separate register is maintained in all the departments to record the internal marks. Internal marks are announced to the students before they are sent to the university. If there is any discrepancy in the internal evaluation, students can represent it to the teacher concerned. Further, for the first year UG students, in Part II- English, an internal viva voce is conducted to test their communication skills.

Behavioural aspects of the students are judged by their participation in external activities (Part - V) and one credit is given to them.

The graduate attributes are ensured through effective teaching of a paper on Social Value Education for the first year students.

The following have been adopted by the institution to facilitate the achievements of the intended learning outcomes:

1. Our College management appoints the adequate teachers against the approved strength. When a vacancy arises, the management appoints temporary teachers, till the approval is received from the Government.
2. A Smart class room is available in our college in which all the technologies are used by the faculty for effective teaching. We have 178 computers, 12 printers, and 5 LCD projectors. Independent learning is encouraged through seminars and assignments.
3. For the purpose of assessing their academic performance, department-wise internal tests are conducted.
4. Individual care is taken by the teacher in-charge to overcome their personal problems.
5. Through various clubs of our college the histrionic skills of our students are developed.

3.1. Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Recognized research centre/s of the affiliating University

The Department of Mathematics and Zoology are recognized research centres affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli.

3.1.2 Research committee to monitor and address the issues of research-composition and Recommendations.

Our college has a Research committee with Dr. R.Sornaraj, Head & Associate Professor of Zoology as the Convener and all the recognized research guides of our college as the members. The main activity of the committee is to promote research activities. Application forms for applying to various funding agencies for minor/major research projects are downloaded and circulated to all the staff members. By the motivation and encouragement given by the research committee over a period of time, so far we have got five major research projects, and two minor research projects.

As a recognition to the successful completion of the previous project by Dr M.Sakthivel, the DST, New Delhi has now sanctioned a research grant of Rs.17,63,100 (Rupees Seventeen Lakhs Sixty Three Thousand and One Hundred) only towards the implementation of his research proposal titled “A portable FRP Carp Hatchery Technology: A successful adoption in adopted villages in Tuticorin District”

The objective of his previous project on Lobster Fattening was to popularize the fattening technology and to make use of the juvenile lobsters for growing them in glass tanks at home. The MPEDA (Marine Product Export and Development Authority of India) is giving 50 to 60% subsidy to the installation of these marine tanks at home to improve the socio – economic condition of unemployed women in the coastal villages.

The main objective of the second project on portable FRP Carp Fishery Technology is to popularize the idea of using the FRP tank instead of glass tanks with the dual purpose of using the same unit for growing food fishes during rainy seasons and for growing live feeds and ornamental fishes during off seasons, ie., dry seasons.

3.1.3 Measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects.

- The Principal Investigator has full freedom to carry out the research work in the college.
- The College provides laboratory facilities with adequate infrastructure to carry out the research work successfully.
- They are free to use the available lab assistants and office assistants.

AS per the norms framed by Manonmaniam Sundaranar University Group projects for U.G. students and individual projects for P.G. students are given to create a research attitude in them. Students are motivated to make use of the library resources, laboratory and other infrastructural facilities.

Second year PG students of Mathematics department are encouraged to attend PhD viva-voce examination which has been conducted in our College. This attempt develops the research attitude of PG students.

The Department of Zoology has a link with the Research department of Zoology, V.O.C.College, Thoothukudi.

The department of Physics has a link with the Research department of Physics, St. Xavier College, Palayamkottai to do research.

The first INSPIRE Internship program at Kamaraj College, Thoothukudi-628003 was successfully conducted during Nov 29 to Dec 3, 2012. The second INSPIRE Science camp was conducted in our college during Nov 28 to Dec 2, 2013. The Inspire Internship program – 2014 was sanctioned to Kamaraj College, Tuticorin in July – 2014 with the support and goodwill of Department of Science And Technology, New Delhi, Govt. of India. The fund was released by DST in August 2014. Dr. G.Vanmathi, Asst. Prof of chemistry, Kamaraj College was the Organizer of this Science Camp too. The third INSPIRE Science camp – 2014 was conducted at Kamaraj College, Thoothukudi during Nov 27 to Dec 01, 2014. The objective of this camp is to attract the talented youth to the excitement and study of science at an early age and to help the country build the required critical resource pool for strengthening and expanding the Science & Technology system and Research & Development base. The timely fund release by DST and the active support by the Management of Kamaraj College, Thoothukudi, played a vital role in the conduct of this science camp. The participants were taken to the following Research Laboratories:

1. Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute, Thoothukudi.
2. NFC Zirconium Plant – Pazhayakayal, Tuticorin.
3. Research Laboratories in Kamaraj College, viz., Dept. of Zoology, Chemistry, Botany, Earth science and Maths.

The students gained a rare insight into the vistas of science through interaction with the eminent personalities directly. This has really inspired them towards Science and Research.

A Science and research motivation programme,” **Young student Scientific Programme**” was conducted for 20 days ,from 07-05-2014 to 26-

05-2014. This programme was sponsored by Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology (Sanction order No. TNSCST/YSSP/VR/2013-2014 dated on 19.12.2013) The programme was organized by Dr. J. Nagarajan, Assistant Professor, Department of Zoology. Under this motivation programme 40 IX *th* Standard students from Government Panchayat schools and others schools, located in rural areas of Ramanathapuram and Thoothukudi Districts were selected, based on their performance in Science subject. They were given special training on science subjects such as physics, chemistry, mathematics, biology, environmental sciences and computer sciences by highly qualified faculty members of various colleges. The students were given theoretical instruction during morning sessions and the afternoons spent on practical work, where they allowed to work independently and field trip to different scientific institutions. During the end of the programme the participated students were divided into groups and made to work on special science and technology project in different disciplines.

Dr J. Poongodi, Associate Professor, Department of Physics organized a national seminar on “ Climate Change Impacts on Environment” on 4th and 5th April 2013 sponsored by Ministry of Earth science, New Delhi. This seminar creates awareness to the participants that Thoothukudi being a coastal area has potential for the production for the tidal energy than other places. In that seminar eminent researchers have submitted papers on the impact of various climatic changes on the environment.

Botany Department is organizing one day study tour for their students every year to visit Tropical Botanical Garden and Research Institute (TBGRI), Palode, Trivandrum to enhance their practical knowledge in the field of Tissue culture, Biotechnology and Medicinal plants.

In our College, two departments namely Mathematics and Zoology are recognized research centres for Doctoral studies. In all the other UG Departments and Part-I Tamil department part-time research scholars are being guided by our research guides. Nineteen faculty members of our college are approved guides for PhD research work by M.S.University, Tirunelveli. 26 Ph.D, scholars are being guided by these approved guides. Two separate rooms are allotted for doing major research projects in our College. Internet facility is provided to these rooms. The library is equipped with research journals, Back volumes and e-Journals. Our college provides free access to UGC N-LIST e- resources to all our research scholars.

Plan

Our institution plans to upgrade PG Departments into Research Centres. Already the PG Department of Chemistry has applied for recognition as research centre for PhD programmes. Upgradation

The Department of Mathematics was upgraded into a Research Centre during the year 2014-2015.

For the major research project of Dr. G.Vanmathi, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, a separate air conditioned room with all necessary facilities is given. For the major project of Dr. J.Mohanraj, Associate Professor of Zoology, a separate room is allotted near the Principals' office and all the necessary facilities are provided in that room.

- A book depot is available in our College to meet the stationery requirements of the students and the staff.
- For residential students Separate hostels with internet facility, TV, sports equipment, reading hall and purified drinking water are available.
- A separate rest room for girl students is available inside the college campus to relax during lunch hours.
- The PTA of our College sponsored for the construction of the vehicle parking facilities earmarked for both the staff and the students.
- A waiting hall for girl students is available in the campus in which the girls assemble together freely before going to the classes.

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

Our College is dedicated to provide all necessary supports to our students for their comprehensive development. The College has a well structured system for student support and mentoring.

5.1.1 Structure and functional characteristics of student supporting and mentoring system.

- A teacher is a friend, a Philosopher and a guide to the students. Our College has a student support and mentoring system which helps them in their all round development.
- The College Staff Council consists of the Principal as the chair person and all the Heads of the Departments, Librarian, Physical Education Director as members. The office Superintendent represents the non-teaching faculty as one of the members. The Council frequently meets and discusses the issues related to students and also the various supporting services available to the students.
- Senior faculties in each academic department will function as Teacher in-charge for individual classes. Teacher in-charge will look into the problems faced by the students in the concerned class and give proper counseling. They act as the mentor of the particular class.

Organization Structure of the Student Support System of the College:

1. Principal
2. College Council (All Heads of the department)
3. Head of the department
4. Teacher in-charge
5. Students

Whenever student(s) of a particular class encountered with a problem, the concerned teacher in-charge takes all necessary steps to solve the problem by

proper counseling. When the teacher in-charge is not able to handle the situation, he will report the matter to the concerned HOD. The HOD after consulting all other members of the department, will try to solve that problem. If the HOD feels it is not within his purview then the matter will be taken to the Principal. After a thorough discussion in the College staff council, Principal will settle the issues.



The college council apart from the settlement of student issues decides various amenities and facilities to be provided to the students and general policy decisions which is fundamental for creating a favorable teaching learning atmosphere.

The functional characteristics of the Student Support System

The institution provides the following functions towards a strong student support system:

- A Parent - Teachers meeting is conducted on the first day of first year UG students and the rules and regulation of the college towards the students are informed to the parents. After the PTA meeting, the Principal and the heads of the departments interact with the first year UG students and enlighten them the facilities available to them in the College and their departments.
- Orientation meeting for hostel students and parents is organized on the day of admission by the Warden - the Principal and Deputy Warden.
- Our College Librarian also gives orientation to the first year UG and PG students regarding the method of using the facilities available in the Library.
- ID cards are provided to students and they are advised them to wear it during College hours.
- Separate canteen facilities are available for boys and girls.
- In the hostel, students' mess is running under dividing system.
- Necessary assistance is provided to the students in opening accounts in Tamilnad Mercantile Bank situated in the College campus and getting ATM cards.

- Transport facilities to girl students.
- Distribution of various financial support schemes like scholarship and loan scholarships to the students.
- Encouraging the students to organize and participate in cultural programmes in our College and the other Colleges.
- Conducting Remedial Coaching classes, Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams, UGC-NET and CSIR.
- Provision for earning while learning for the benefit of students.

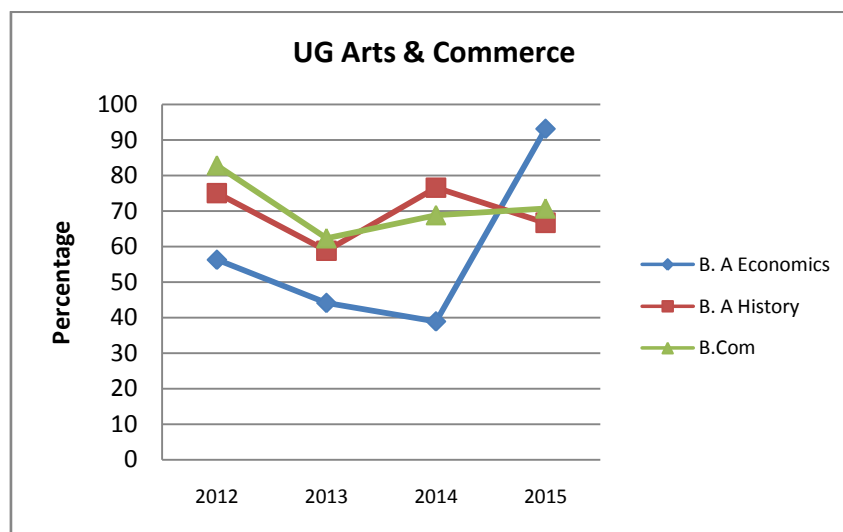

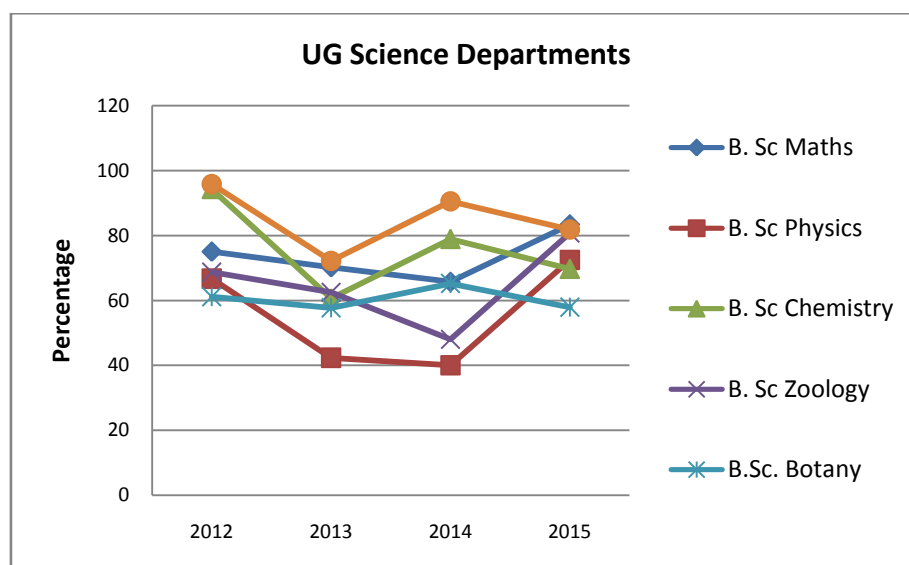

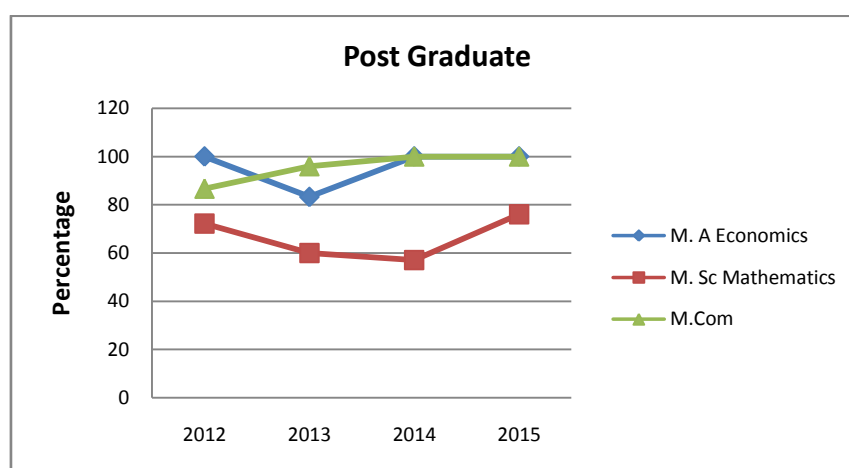

For UG Science Department

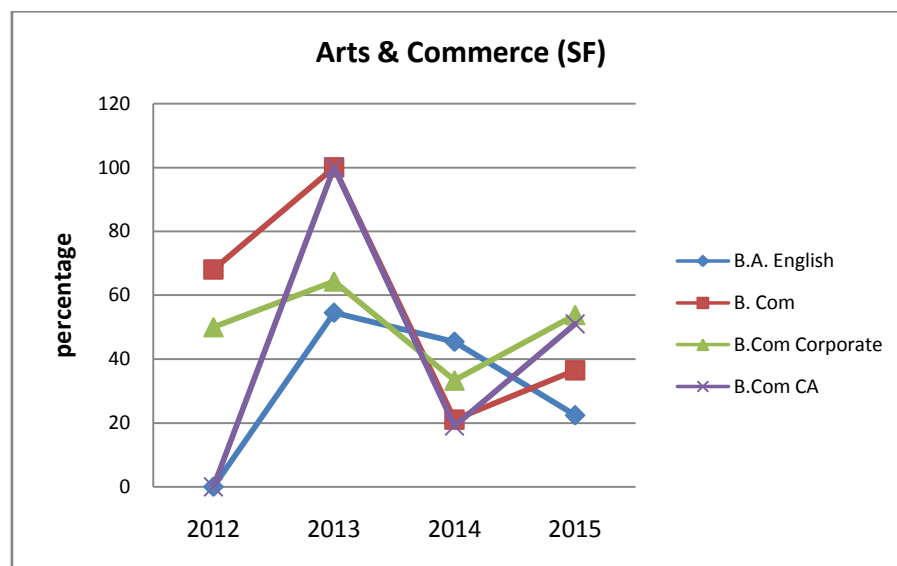


For Post graduate department



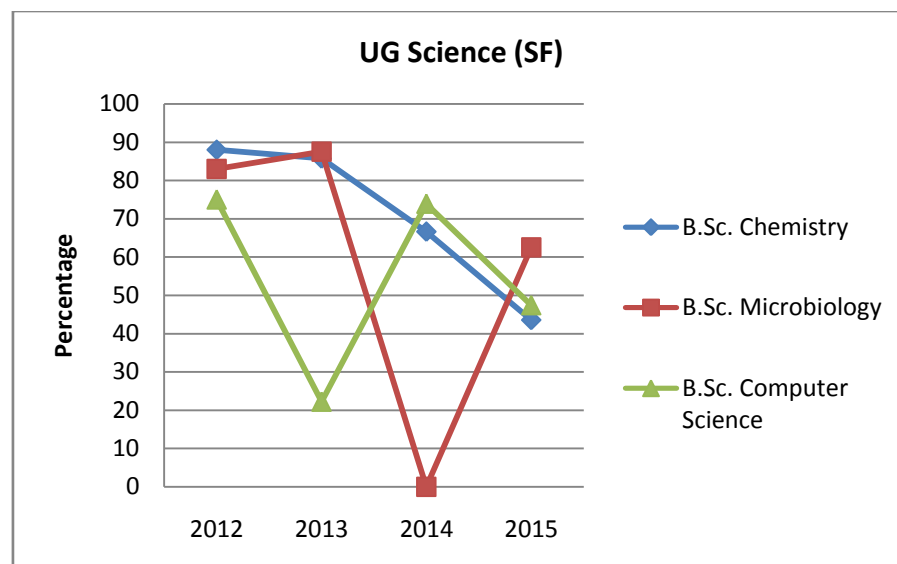

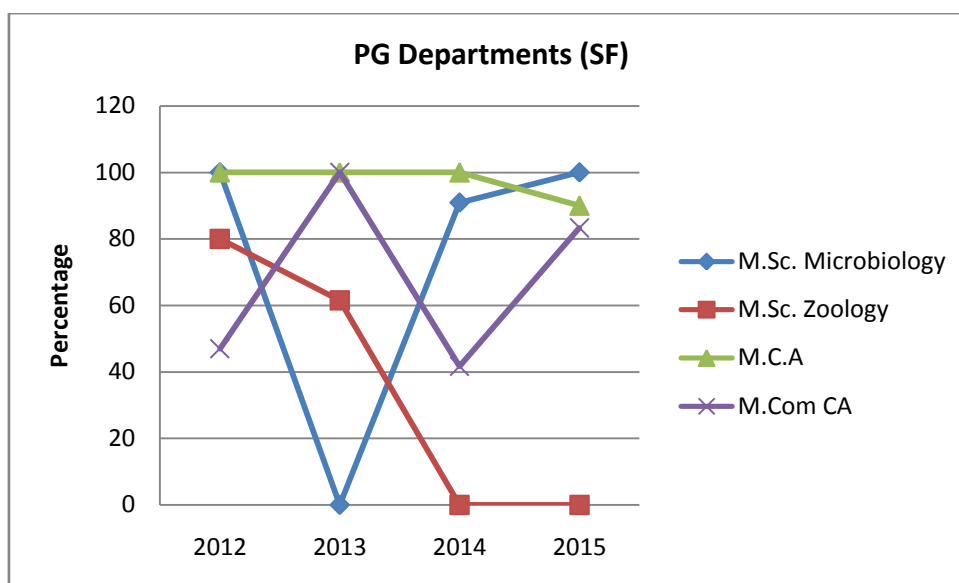
Note: The above graph shows 0% of pass for BA (English) and B.Com (CA) because the number of students in the year 2012 is nil.

Industry interaction programme

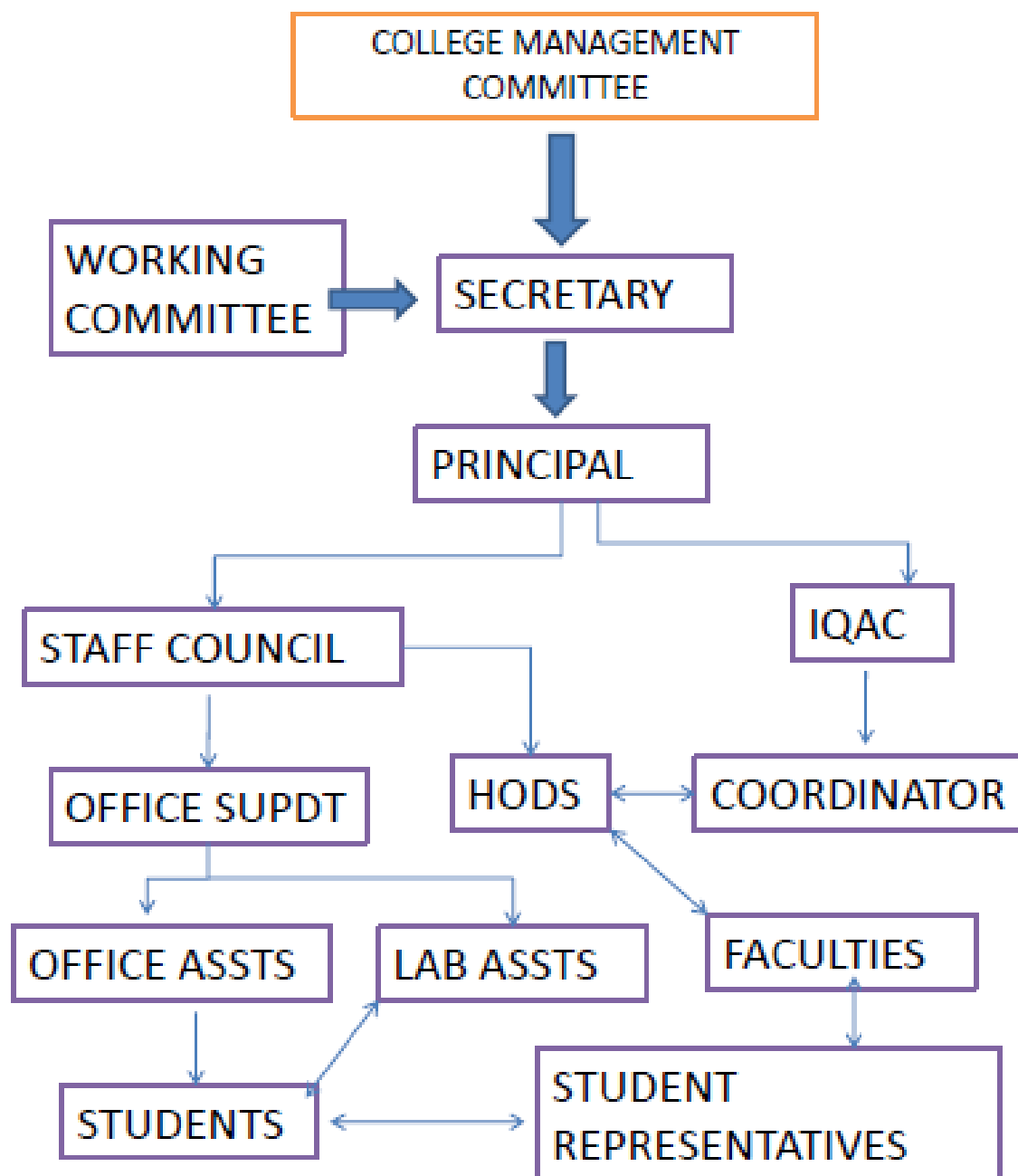

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilisation

6.4.1 Institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources

- ❖ Our college is an aided College hence the financial resources are received from the government through the Director of Collegiate Education.
- ❖ The fee prescribed by the Tamilnadu Government is collected from the student every year and deposited under relevant heads at Tamilnad Mercantile Bank by getting a special GO from the Government.
- ❖ For UGC related transactions we have an account with SBI, BazarBranch, Thoothukudi.
- ❖ Receipts and Expenditure accounts are prepared every month and sent to the Director of Collegiate Education. The Director in turn reconciles the figures with Accountant General.
- ❖ The fees collected from the students under various heads such as Union, Games, Magazine, Calendar, etc. are being spent for the purpose for which it was collected based on resolution by the committee formed every year for each head.

6.4.2 Mechanism for internal and external audit and its details.

- ❖ Being a Grade I Aided College, the internal audit is conducted by the statutory auditor of the College every year. The external audit is conducted by the officers of Regional Joint Director of Collegiate Education, Tirunelveli and the Accountant General once in five years.

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1. Green audit of college campus

- In our College, Green audit is carried out regularly.
- The college takes all efforts to maintain a green environment in the campus.
- NSS volunteers take adequate efforts to make the college eco-friendly and to maintain the eco-friendly environment in the college campus.
- While making strategic planning for the development of the College campus priority is given to the energy saving, water conservation and green environment.
- For all UG first year classes Environmental study one of the subjects in the first semester in order to inculcate the values of Environment.
- Name plates having Botanical names of all trees and plants inside campus are displayed in the respective trees and plants.
- A green house is maintained to grow Medicinal plant in our campus.
- We have composite bins to collect food wastage and other polythene materials inside the campus.
- Rain water harvesting facility is available in all the buildings in the campus.
- It is important to say that our College chemistry students are using the pure rain water collected through rain water harvesting system for their laboratory works instead of distilled water. The green house of Botanical Garden is functioning with the rain water harvesting system.

Initiatives taken by the college Energy Conservation

- In our College the class rooms are with adequate ventilation and natural brightness and hence there is no need for artificial lighting during day time. All the class rooms are furnished with good lighting facilities during rainy days.
- In computer labs the systems are properly shutdown after usage to avoid the wastage of electricity.
- All the lab assistants are sufficiently instructed to verify whether all the plug

points are switched off before closing the laboratories.

- The dry leaves and the waste papers are made to compost and used as organic manure in botanical garden and green house.
- Energy consumption in the hostel is closely monitored by the residential superintendents.
- There is strict adherence to college norms of turning off electricity during day time in hostels.

Efforts for Pollution Free Environment

- A large number of trees are planted and maintained by NSS volunteers and NCC cadets in the College campus to make the environment pollution free.
- The teachers in-charge of all classes motivate the students to use bicycles instead of two wheelers for creating pollution free environment.
- Our College campus has more numbers of trees and the dry leaves are collected and converted into manure.
- Our College canteen uses paper plates and paper cups for the staff and students.
- Special programs are organized for plantation of trees within the campus every year.

Waste Management

- In our College, Chemistry lab assistants are advised to collect the solid waste in the lab separately and to dispose it carefully without causing any harm to the students.
- There is a special drainage system in the chemistry lab to dispose the chemical waste from the lab.
- There are sufficient numbers of exhaust fans provided.
- All the heads of the departments are advised to collect e-waste and hand over it to the concerned organization.
- All stationary waste from the office, library and departments is disposed of by open auction.
- Our College has taken steps for office automation to reduce the paper utilization in the principal's office.
- The liters are collected and used for manure formation for the garden plants.
